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## AROUND THE CAPITOL

Today is the second day of funnel. Both chambers approved resolutions on the floor but concentrated on committee and subcommittee work. Wednesday should be another busy day in committee; committee work is likely to slack off on Thursday, but introductions of new and successor bills should be heavy until at least Monday.

The House and Senate Judiciary committees were the two busiest committees today. Both passed out the bills Governor Reynolds proposed to deal with fentanyl overdoses ([HSB 104 GOVERNORS FENTANYL PROPOSALS](#) and [SSB 1096 GOVERNORS FENTANYL PROPOSALS](#)). The bill increases the penalties for manufacturing and selling fentanyl and increases the sentences if the fentanyl is linked to an overdose death. The bill also makes opioid antagonists more widely available.

The House and Senate Health & Human Services committees moved bills on asset testing for the SNAP (food stamps). Legislators have been unable to enact these bills in past sessions, but Speaker Grassley is the lead sponsor on [HF 3 WELFARE TESTING](#). The bill had 38 Republican co-sponsors. The House committee approved [HF 3](#) on a 12-9 vote; the Senate committee approved the bill on a 9-4 vote.

Subcommittees in the House and Senate moved bills to limit gender affirming surgery and hormonal treatment for minors ([SSB 1197](#) and [HSB 214](#)) and to require schools to designate school bathrooms for the use of a single sex ([HSB 208 DESIGNATING SCHOOL BATHROOMS](#) and [SF 335 SCHOOL RESTROOMS](#)) to the full committee. The Senate Education Committee is scheduled to take up [SF 335](#).

The House Judiciary Committee moved forward [HF 368 PIPELINE RULES](#) on a 12-7 vote, with most of the Democrats voting against the bill. Representative Wilburn said that he is concerned that the changes to eminent domain will hurt local governments.

Governor Reynolds said that the state of Iowa has selected Odyssey to administer the new Education Savings Accounts approved in [HF 68 EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS](#). The new accounts fund tuition at private schools and are expected to cost about \$315 million. The state issued an RFP in January and after a competitive process, selected Odyssey. A statement from the Governor's Office said that Odyssey "was chosen based on its ability to manage all aspects of program administration, including applications, financial transactions, compliance, fraud prevention, and customer service." Odyssey currently manages ESA programs in two other states.

## HOUSE COMMITTEE ACTION

### House Agriculture Committee: Voted Out (5)

#### **HF 388 FLYING DRONES OVER FARMS**

Makes it a simple misdemeanor, subject to enhancement as a serious misdemeanor or an aggravated misdemeanor, for flying a drone (remote-piloted aircraft) over a farm home or a secured area (barn or feedlot where animals are kept). Makes definitions. **PASSED** 13-10; *FM: Wulf*

#### **HF 389 FARM EDUCATION**

Establishes an Agriculture Education Grant program in the DOE to help high schools pay for the cost of agriculture education teachers. Allows 100% of the grant to be used for teachers for programs that are less than 10 years old and 50% of the grant for other programs. Requires the DOE to develop a system for schools to track the time used by teachers under the grant. Requires the state BOE to adopt rules for the program. **PASSED** 22-0; *FM: Ingels*

#### **HSB 139 VETERINARY SUPERVISION**

Allows for licensed veterinarian to delegate certain tasks to veterinary auxiliaries operating under various levels of supervision. Includes classifications of assistants, techs, students and graduates of foreign vet schools. Requires the vet to examine the animal before deciding the level of supervision. Includes requirements for training and scope of authority for the various classes. Requires the BVM to adopt rules. Makes definitions. Includes penalties. **AMENDED & PASSED** 23-0; *FM: Sexton*

#### **HSB 155 DAIRY INNOVATION FUND**

Creates a dairy innovation fund in the EDA for grants to dairy projects and specifies kinds of projects that are eligible. Allows the EDA to establish eligibility by rule. Does not allow a grant for more than the project cost. Allows businesses to seek other assistance besides the dairy grants. **AMENDED & PASSED** 23-0; *FM: Mommsen*

#### **HSB 157 BIOGAS LINES**

Allows a person to run biogas gathering lines from an aerobic digester to a collecting point through a public road right-of-way under the same conditions as a public utility. Effective on enactment. **PASSED** 21-2; *FM: Sexton*

### House Economic Growth & Technology Committee: Voted Out (3)

#### **HSB 151 STATE SOFTWARE AGREEMENTS**

Prohibits a software licensing agreement from preventing a state agency from using additional software or hardware with their equipment. **AMENDED & PASSED** 13-8; *FM: Wood*

#### **HSB 153 RANSOMWARE ATTACKS**

Prohibits the state and local governments from making ransomware payments. Requires ransomware attacks be reported to the Chief Information Officer. Allows the CIO to adopt rules and to take action in emergency situations. Allows the purchase of ransomware insurance. Makes definitions. Includes legislative intent. Various effective dates. **AMENDED & PASSED** 13-8; *FM: Wood*

#### **HSB 154 SMART CONTRACTS/CYBERSECURITY**

States that records, signatures or contracts will not be invalid due to the use of distributed ledger technology or smart contracts. Establishes affirmative defenses for entities which use cybersecurity programs. Contains related provisions. **AMENDED & PASSED** 21-0; *FM: Kniff McCulla*

## HOUSE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### House Health & Human Services Committee: Voted Out (4)

#### [HF 3](#) WELFARE TESTING

**SNAP:** Requires the HHS to develop computerized identity authentication before awarding SNAP benefits. Requires an asset test for all members of a household for SNAP. Includes various data sources that HHS must access. Includes annual reporting requirements. **Eligibility:** Requires DHHS to review the eligibility of individuals already receiving SNAP or Medicaid and to cross check data on a monthly basis. **Wellness Waiver:** Requires HHS to seek a federal waiver to allow certain members of the Iowa Health & Wellness plan whose enrollment has been terminated to re-enroll without paying outstanding balances, unless membership has been previously terminated for not paying membership contributions. Includes exceptions. **SNAP food:** Requests a waiver to make eligible SNAP foods the same as WIC foods. Appropriates \$1 million for the double up food program for purchase of fruits and vegetables. Requires grant recipients to match the assistance. **Other:** Includes provisions for phasing in implementation and steps for HHS to take related to the potential denial of waivers. **PASSED 12-9; FM: *Jeneary***

#### [HF 373](#) FOSTER PARENTS

Establishes rights of foster care parents and responsibilities of HHS. Requires HHS establish a process for foster parents to file a complaint electronically regarding violations of the rights of foster parents. Requires the HHS to describe any training opportunities to foster care parents that the HHS believes could benefit the parents. **AMENDED & PASSED 21-0; FM: *Fry***

#### [HF 386](#) HEALTH ADVISORY GROUPS

Allows the legislative Health Policy Oversight Committee to meet during the interim and strikes requirements for it to meet during the interim. Requires the various health policy groups under HHS include remote participation options. Eliminates various health advisory councils under HHS and re-assigns their duties and reduces the number of members of others. Strikes the requirement for per diem payments and expense reimbursements. **PASSED 13-8; FM: *Fry***

#### [HSB 202](#) PHARMACY MATTERS

Reorganizes provisions on the practice of pharmacy. States general principles that pharmacists and registrants under the BOP must follow. Requires the BOP to adopt rules on pharmacist interns, technicians and support personnel, on tele-pharmacies, and on other matters. Includes requirements for the rules and strikes provisions in Code. Allows the BOP to discipline a pharmacist for engaging in conduct outside of the standard of care. Authorizes administrative penalties. Allows the BOP to request criminal history checks on various parties. Contains provisions on prescriptions, therapeutic substitutions and other related matters. **PASSED 21-0; FM: *Bergan***

### House Judiciary Committee: Voted Out (13)

#### [HF 125](#) HUMAN TRAFFICKING RESTITUTION

Strikes the requirements for restitution for a felony that causes a death if the offender was under 18 or if the offender's crime was due to being a victim of human trafficking. **PASSED 21-0; FM: *Shipley***

## HOUSE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### House Judiciary Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### **HF 368 PIPELINE RULES**

**CO2:** Prohibits the IUB from issuing a permit for a liquid CO2 (carbon capture) pipeline until federal safety rules have been adopted. Requires a pipeline to acquire all other applicable permits before being granted a permit from the IUB. **ED:** Requires that a CO2 pipeline receive permission to build on 90% of an affected route before eminent domain authority can be issued. Requires regular reports on easements. **Restoration:** Allows a landowner to file complaints with the IUB on violations of land restoration standards. **Loss:** Includes soil compaction, damage to water and soil conservation structures and irrigation systems as compensable damages. Includes tenants as landowners. Allows any identifiable loss to be part of an action for compensable loss. Allows actions in small claims. **Other:** Effective on enactment and retroactive to pipeline applications since 7/2021. **PASSED 12-7; FM: Holt**

#### **HSB 2 TERMINATING LEASES**

Allows a tenant to terminate a lease early and without penalty if the tenant is the victim of domestic or sexual abuse, stalking or other crimes with a risk of death or injury. Requires written notice to the landlord and specific documentation. Makes the tenant liable for the rent in the month the tenant ends the lease. Deems that the tenant cannot be subject to a negative reference or fee due to the termination of the lease. Includes confidentiality provisions. **PASSED 21-0; FM: Kaufmann**

#### **HSB 43 SEALING EVICTION RECORDS**

Requires eviction (forceable entry and detainer) records be sealed if the case is dismissed or the defendant is found not guilty, or there is no genuine issue between the parties, or the plaintiff does not appear. Sets guidelines allowing the sealing of records in five years for non-payment of rent. Includes requirements for sealing records, including limiting reporting by consumer credit agencies. **AMENDED & PASSED 21-0; FM: C Thomson**

#### **HSB 104 GOVERNORS FENTANYL PROPOSALS**

**Fentanyl:** Makes manufacturing/selling/possessing more than 50 grams of fentanyl a Class B felony (50 years and up to \$1 million in fines); for amounts between 5-50 grams a Class B felony (25 years and a fine between \$5,000 and \$100,000); for measurable amounts, a Class C felony and fine between \$1,000 and \$50,000.

**Death:** Triples the sentence of a person who manufactures a controlled substance that results in death and double if it results in serious injury. Does not allow the sentence to be deferred or for the manufacturer to use protections for someone who assists a person who overdoses. **Minors:** Adds current enhancements for manufacturing meth in the presence of minors to the manufacture of controlled substances and increases the penalty by doubling the sentence. Strikes certain 99-year sentences for dealing meth with minors and doubles the sentence instead. Includes additional substances under provisions covering deliver of controlled substances to minors. **Opioid Antagonists:** Allows a health care provider to prescribe opioid antagonists to a secondary distributor and for a pharmacist to dispense them to a secondary distributor. Defines secondary distributors (law enforcement, EMS, health care providers, schools, county health departments, HHS). Allows a pharmacist to administer opioid antagonists instead of naloxone. **AMENDED & PASSED 14-7; FM: P Thompson**

#### **HSB 110 CHINA PROCEEDINGS**

Allows a court to consider services given to a family prior to a CHINA proceeding when considering whether to waive reasonable efforts to keep a child with the family. Includes the HHS and HHS agents in the definition of criminal or juvenile justice agency in CHINA related proceedings. **PASSED 21-0; FM: Kaufmann**

## HOUSE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### House Judiciary Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### [HSB 131](#) REAL ESTATE LICENSE REVOCATIONS

Deems that only the dates when violations by a real estate broker occurred shall be considered when determining if the broker has committed the three violations in a three-year period needed to trigger an automatic license revocation. **AMENDED & PASSED 14-7; FM: *Lohse***

#### [HSB 149](#) OWI BLOOD WITHDRAWALS

Authorizes various medical technologists to draw blood in OWI cases. **AMENDED & PASSED 14-7; FM: *P Thompson***

#### [HSB 159](#) CODE EDITOR I

Makes the non-substantive Code editor changes. **AMENDED & PASSED 21-0; FM: *Nordman***

#### [HSB 171](#) CODE EDITOR II

Makes the statutory Code editor changes. **PASSED 21-0; FM: *Gustafson***

#### [HSB 172](#) TRIBES AS JUSTICE AGENCIES

Adds federally recognized Indian tribes to the definition of criminal and juvenile justice agencies. **AMENDED & PASSED 21-0; FM: *Dunwell***

#### [HSB 195](#) ELECTRONIC PROPERTY TRANSACTIONS

Amends Iowa UCC provisions on electronic property. **PASSED 21-0; FM: *Lohse***

#### [HSB 203](#) ENTICING & OBSCENITY OFFENSES

**Enticement:** Makes enticement a Class C felony if the enticer intends to commit sexual exploitation and reasonably believes the victim to be under 13; Class D, if the enticer intends an illegal sex act and the victim is under 16; an aggravated misdemeanor if the enticer intends an illegal act and the victim is under 16; and, a Class C felony if the enticer intends a prohibited sex act or simulation of such an act and the victim is under 18. Includes law enforcement officer posing as minors. **Obscene materials:** Makes it an aggravated misdemeanor for a 1st offense, and Class D felony for subsequent offenses, to distribute obscene material to a minor under 18 by phone. Includes law enforcement officer posing as minors. **AMENDED & PASSED 21-0; FM: *Kaufmann***

### House Labor & Workforce: Voted Out (1)

#### [HSB 201](#) STATE PARENTAL LEAVE

Gives state employees the right to take paid parental leave under the FMLA (four weeks paid leave for a parent who gives birth or adopts, and one-week paid leave for the other parent). Requires the leave to be taken within twelve months of the birth or adoption. Requires the DAS to adopt rules. **PASSED 16-1; FM: *Bergan***

### House Local Government Committee: Voted Out (6)

#### [HF 126](#) LOCAL MANAGEMENT LEVY

Allows a local emergency management agency to levy for the agency and strikes the county authority. Deems the agency a municipality for certain purposes. **PASSED 18-3; FM: *Nordman***

#### [HF 289](#) LAKE ELECTIONS

Requires elections for benefitted recreational lake and water quality districts to be conducted by the county commissioner of elections (auditor). **PASSED 21-0; FM: *Nordman***

## HOUSE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### House Local Government Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### HF 295 COUNTY BUILDINGS

Strikes requirements for counties to consider buying or leasing vacant school buildings before building or leasing a new facility. **PASSED** 14-7; *FM: Determann*

#### HF 416 SANITARY DISTRICT BUDGETS

Requires a sanitary district to certify its budget by March 15. **PASSED** 21-0; *FM: Nordman*

#### HSB 163 LAND DIVISION APPROVAL

Prohibits city councils and county supervisors from approving the division or consolidation of land without a certificate from the treasurer that the land is free from taxes/assessments. Requires the recorder to refuse to register any documents related to a division/consolidation without the same proof. **PASSED** 21-0; *FM: Rinker*

#### HSB 164 COUNTY LAND RECORDS

Allows the County Land Record Information System to allow batch access to groundwater hazard statements through the DNR for access to aggregate anonymous data. Allows for fees. Requires the establishment of policies on limitation of uses, authentication of users and prohibitions on foreign access of records. **PASSED** 19-2; *FM: Golding*

### House Natural Resources Committee: Voted Out (1)

#### HF 449 CROSSBOW HUNTING

Allows a physical therapist to make the declaration that a hunter is physically incapable of using a bow and needs to use a crossbow instead. **PASSED** 18-3; *FM: M Thompson*

### House Public Safety Committee: Voted Out (4)

#### HF 119 ASSAULTS ON PREGNANT WOMEN

Increases the penalties for assaults against a pregnant woman by one step. Makes it a Class C felony to assault a woman whom the offender knew was pregnant or should have known was pregnant, if the assault causes serious injury. **AMENDED & PASSED** 14-5; *FM: Shipley*

#### HF 178 VEHICLE PROTECTION ORDERS

Requires a defendant or respondent, as applicable, in various harassing/stalking cases to give vehicle information for the protective order and to update the information as needed. Requires the information to be filed with the clerk of courts. Requires the clerk to notify the court if the information is not filed. Requires a defendant or respondent who does not do so to be held in contempt of court. **AMENDED & PASSED** 13-6; *FM: Shipley*

#### HF 301 TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS

**Paraphernalia:** Makes the scheduled fine for possession of paraphernalia a \$265 fine. **Reckless Driving:** Makes it a prima facie case of reckless driving if a driver is traveling more than 35 mph over the speed limit or passing another vehicle on the crest of a hill or curve where the sight of the driver is obstructed. **Passing:** Requires drivers to move into another lane if possible, when passing a slow-moving (15 mph) vehicle or to slow down to 20 mph under the speed limit. **School Bus:** Does not require a driver cited for failing to stop for a school bus to purchase SR-22 insurance for all vehicles owned by the person. **Fines:** Reduces fines for windshields to \$35. Increases the fine for speeding to \$10 for every mile over. Makes the scheduled fine for not driving at a reasonable speed, but not exceeding the speed limit, \$135. Reduces seat belt fines to \$50. **PASSED** 17-2; *FM: Dieken*

## HOUSE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### House Public Safety Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### HSB 166 DOT PEACE OFFICER TRANSITION

Establishes a process for transitioning motor vehicle enforcement officers in the DOT to the DPS. Keeps transferred employees with ten years of service in IPERS; moves officers with less than ten years of service to PORS. Authorizes DOT to designate certain employees with limited authority as peace officers. Requires fines attributable to commercial motor vehicles that are issued by the DPS to be scooped for the RUTF.

**AMENDED & PASSED** 18-1; *FM: P Thompson*

### House State Government Committee: Voted Out (1)

#### HF 265 MIDWIFE LICENSING

Establishes provisions for midwife licensing. Requires a license by July 2024. Includes exemptions for the Amish and Mennonites, Native American tribes and certain other persons. Requires an applicant to be 21 and to have completed certain training. Prohibits unlicensed persons from using the term licensed midwife. Limits the liability of a health care provider who accepts a transfer of a patient from a midwife. Establishes a board. **PASSED** 17-6; *FM: Kaufmann*

## SENATE COMMITTEE ACTION

### Senate Agriculture Committee: Voted Out (2)

#### SF 404 LIVESTOCK HEALTH COUNCIL

Makes changes to the membership of the Livestock Health Advisory Council. Moves the meetings of the council to ISU. **PASSED** 16-0; *FM: Shipley*

#### SSB 1183 VETERINARY SUPERVISION

Allows for licensed veterinarian to delegate certain tasks to veterinary auxiliaries operating under various levels of supervision. Includes classifications of assistants, techs, students and graduates of foreign vet schools. Requires the vet to examine the animal before deciding the level of supervision. Includes requirements for training and scope of authority for the various classes. Requires the BVM to adopt rules. Makes definitions. Includes penalties. **AMENDED & PASSED** 16-0; *FM: Zumbach*

### Senate Health & Human Services Committee: Voted Out (4)

#### SSB 1105 PUBLIC ASSISTANCE OVERSIGHT

**SNAP:** Requires the HHS to conduct an asset check on all members of the household of a SNAP recipient. Requires the HHS to enter into memos of understanding with any necessary department. Requires someone receiving SNAP benefits to cooperate with the CSRU. **Other:** Requires the HHS to redesign and implement a new computer verification system for income and eligibility for other kinds of public benefits by July 2024. Includes notice and appeals provisions. Allows the HHS to contract with a 3rd-party vendor. Requires applicants to complete a computerized authentication process and requires the HHS to terminate an application if the applicant files to do so. Requires the HHS to take no further action if it finds a discrepancy in eligibility but to HHS to notify the applicant. Requires HHS to seek any needed waiver. Allows HHS to refer cases of potential fraud to the appropriate agency and may take measures to collect amounts from fraud that is substantiated with a conviction. Includes reporting requirements for the authentication measures and the impact on public assistance. **AMENDED & PASSED** 9-4; *FM: Edler*

## SENATE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### Senate Health & Human Services Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### SSB 1117 CERTIFICATE OF NEED

**CON:** Changes the Certificate of Need process. Changes definitions to exclude community MH centers and birthing centers from the CON process. Changes the definition of new/changed institutional health service to exclude some of these services from the CON. **HFC:** Strikes some of the requirements for membership on the Health Facilities Council, including requirements for bipartisan balance. Changes the term for members to three years and allows the members to select the chair. **Application:** Makes the CON application fee a flat fee of \$1,000 and allows a 75% refund if the application is withdrawn. Requires an economic impact statement. Allows a revised application to be resubmitted after a rejection without another application fee. Makes other changes to the application process. **AMENDED & PASSED 9-4; FM: *Edler***

#### SSB 1166 MH SERVICES

Makes changes to MH/DD services. **SA:** Removes a person with only SA problems from eligibility for a state MHI. **MHI:** Designates the Independence MHI for specialized treatment of youth and Cherokee for the specialized treatment of adults. **ChINA:** Allows a guardian to enter into a safety plan during a ChINA and prohibits a safety plan as being construed as the removal of a child without a court order to that effect. Makes corrections regarding ChINA cases. **Regions:** Increases the amount of reserves an MH/DS region can have to 10% before payments to the region are reduced. Makes corresponding changes to cash flow. Makes changes to governance. Adds additional services to the regions and reporting requirements by the HHS. **Adoption:** Requires an adoption petitioner to give any siblings of the person to be adopted at least 20 days' notice before a hearing when on-going contact is in the child's best interest. Allows for notice through regular mail. Includes circumstances where notice is not required. **Incompetency:** Requires the MH/DS region of residency to pay for the pre-trial costs of MH treatment for a person found to be incompetent to stand trial. Includes requirements for written status reports and on who can evaluate the person. Includes provisions on notice when a person is restored to competency. **AMENDED & PASSED 13-0; FM: *Edler***

#### SSB 1167 MEDICAID RECOVERIES & MCO PREMIUMS (now SF 462)

Makes changes to Medicaid governance, including on recoveries from 3rd-parties and the taxation of premiums related to MCOs. Includes implementing provisions. **AMENDED & PASSED 9-4; FM: *Edler***

### Senate Judiciary Committee: Voted Out (9)

#### SF 221 POSSESSING IMAGES OF MINORS

Deems that the knowing purchase or possession of multiple images of a minor engaged in a prohibited sexual act shall be treated as multiple offenses. **PASSED 18-0; FM: *J Taylor***

#### SF 256 REASONABLE FORCE PROSECUTIONS

Prohibits another prosecutor from bringing a case against a police officer if the AG has determined that a death caused by the officer had legal justification for deadly force. **PASSED 12-6; FM: *Dawson***

#### SF 270 ACCESSORY TO MURDER

Increases the penalty for being an accessory after the fact for various murder offenses (1st degree, 2nd degree, solicitation for murder) to a Class D felony. **PASSED 18-0; FM: *Evans***

## SENATE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### Senate Judiciary Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### **SSB 1067 PROBATE PROCEEDINGS**

Makes changes to probate proceedings, including requests by fiduciaries, requiring executors to request certified copies of wills and on making tortious interference claims. Makes changes to guardianships for children. Assesses the cost of a trial transcript for an indigent defendant to the county. Makes changes to requests by trustees regarding property, including good faith protections and penalties for unreasonable actions of withholding property. Allows the agent of a protected person to establish a medical needs trust.

**PASSED** 18-0; *FM: Boussetot*

#### **SSB 1096 GOVERNORS FENTANYL PROPOSALS**

**Fentanyl:** Makes manufacturing/selling/possessing more than 50 grams of fentanyl a Class B felony (50 years and up to \$1 million in fines); for amounts between 5-50 grams a Class B felony (25 years and a fine between \$5,000 and \$100,000); for measurable amounts, a Class C felony and fine between \$1,000 and \$50,000.

**Death:** Triples the sentence of a person who manufactures a controlled substance that results in death and double if it results in serious injury. Does not allow the sentence to be deferred or for the manufacturer to use protections for someone who assists a person who overdoses. **Minors:** Adds current enhancements for manufacturing meth in the presence of minors to the manufacture of controlled substances and increases the penalty by doubling the sentence. Strikes certain 99-year sentences for dealing meth with minors and doubles the sentence instead. Includes additional substances under provisions covering deliver of controlled substances to minors. **Opioid Antagonists:** Allows a health care provider to prescribe opioid antagonists to a secondary distributor and for a pharmacist to dispense them to a secondary distributor. Defines secondary distributors (law enforcement, EMS, health care providers, schools, county health departments, HHS).

Allows a pharmacist to administer opioid antagonists instead of naloxone. **AMENDED & PASSED** 18-0; *FM: Reichmann*

#### **SSB 1112 CHINA PROCEEDINGS**

Allows a court to consider services given to a family prior to a CHINA proceeding when considering whether to waive reasonable efforts to keep a child with the family. Includes the HHS and HHS agents in the definition of criminal or juvenile justice agency in CHINA related proceedings. **AMENDED & PASSED** 18-0;

*FM: Shipley*

#### **SSB 1120 JUDICIAL BRANCH BILL**

**Advocates:** Strikes the need for the Judicial Council to develop best practices for patient advocates.

**Jurors:** Authorizes the DOR to give the State Court Administrator certain information about taxpayers, including the last four SSN digits, in order to prepare grand and petit juror lists. Deems some of the information confidential. **Judges:** Allows the Supreme Court to use a weighted workload formula to assign associate district judgeships. **Reporters:** Deems audio/video records by court reporters taken for the purpose of creating transcripts to be the personal property of the reporter. Allows an in camera review by the judge for good cause. Allows criminal history information to be given to an accused or the attorney of the accused through a court order, or if the information is part of the prosecution's file and subject to discovery, without a court order. **AMENDED & PASSED** 18-0; *FM: Rowley*

## SENATE COMMITTEE ACTION (CONTINUED)

### Senate Judiciary Committee: Voted Out (continued)

#### **SSB 1151** DOMESTIC ABUSE/RISK ASSESSMENTS

Requires a peace officer to make a risk assessment of the person the officer believes to be the primary physical aggressor when the officer has reason to believe that domestic abuse has occurred but that no arrest has been made. Requires the DOJ to develop risk assessments. Requires risk assessments be performed on arrested persons, prior to release, and the risk assessment given to the appropriate Judicial District/DOC department. Establishes criteria for the DOJ to adopt risk assessments. Requires the DOJ to prepare information for domestic abuse victims and others, including information on assistance that may be available to a primary physical aggressor. Requires that the DOJ use best practices. Includes other provisions. **AMENDED & PASSED** 18-0; FM: *J Taylor*

#### **SSB 1163** SENIOR MAGISTRATES

Requires a senior magistrate to live in the judicial district of appointment and to serve in only one district. Pays the magistrate on a per diem basis and limits service to 60 days in a year. Allows the Supreme Court to appoint senior magistrates who meet qualifying requirements and who agree to be available for judicial duties. Requires the clerk of the Supreme Court to maintain a roster of senior magistrates. Allows a senior magistrate to continue to practice law. Includes provisions on terms, retirement and other matters. **PASSED** 18-0; FM: *J Taylor*

### Senate Rules Committee: Voted Out (1)

#### **SR 3** COMMUNITY COLLEGE DAY

Makes February 28, 2023, as Community College Day to educate people about the impact of community colleges in Iowa. **PASSED** 7-0; FM: *Kraayenbrink*

### Senate Veterans Affairs Committee: Voted Out (1)

#### **SSB 1174** VETERAN BUSINESS LOANS (now SF 461)

Allows the State Treasurer to make loans through the Small Business Linked Investment Program to businesses which are 51% owned by veterans. Defines veterans. **PASSED** 12-0; FM: *Reichman*

## HOUSE FILES (HF 480 – HF 488)

### **HF 480 CONTRACEPTIVE EDUCATION** ([Staed, 6 D's](#)) (Education)

Requires HS human growth & development (sex ed) courses include instruction on contraceptive methods, including condoms, implanted devices and intrauterine devices.

### **HF 481 RESERVE SCHOLARSHIPS** ([Latham](#)) (Appropriations)

Establishes an Army Reserve scholarship program in the CSC for undergraduate degrees. Establishes criteria for Reserve members to receive scholarships. Caps the scholarship at the resident tuition rate for state universities and allows the CSC to lower the amount, depending on funding. Limits the payments to 120 credit hours, or 130 for some STEM programs.

### **HF 482 DESIGNATING SCHOOL BATHROOMS II** ([Hayes](#)) (Judiciary)

Requires public and private K-12 schools to prohibit the use of a multi-occupant bathroom by more than one sex. Prohibits persons from entering a school bathroom for the other biological sex and exempts the bill from the provisions of the Iowa Civil Rights Act. Similar to [HSB 208](#)

### **HF 483 PARDON ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS** ([Gustoff](#)) (Judiciary)

Requires the BOP to acknowledge the receipt of an application for a pardon, restoration of citizenship rights and similar petitions in 30 days and to make a recommendation to the Governor within one year.

### **HF 484 REMOTE NOTARIZATIONS** ([Gustoff](#)) (Judiciary)

Authorizes notaries to notarize documents for a remotely located person using various communication technologies. Requires that the notary be assured of the identity of the remote person and includes criteria for doing so. Does not require notaries to perform such acts remotely.

### **HF 485 JOINT PHYSICAL CARE** ([Hayes](#)) (Judiciary)

Deems that an award of joint legal custody creates a rebuttable presumption that joint physical care is in the best interest of the child. Requires a court to order joint physical care to a parent with joint legal custody if requested and if the presumption has not been rebutted. See [SF 274](#)

### **HF 486 FUNDAMENTAL PARENTAL RIGHTS** ([Andrews](#)) (Judiciary)

Establishes that parents have fundamental rights related to the upbringing, care and education of their children and requires that courts review interference with strict scrutiny. Deems that divorce or marital status does not diminish these rights. Presumes that the actions of a fit parent are in the best interests of the child and requires the state to overcome this presumption with clear and convincing evidence. Prohibits state action until the presumption is overcome.

### **HF 487 CHAMBER BUCKS** ([Collins](#)) (Local Government)

Makes chamber bucks, purchased through a chamber of commerce for redemption in local businesses, subject to the laws on gift certificates.

### **HF 488 GUN SERIAL NUMBERS** ([Staed, 5 D's](#)) (Public Safety)

Requires the DPS, in consultation with the ATF, to develop a system of serial numbers for parts of firearms by December 2023. Requires persons to request a serial number before completing the manufacture of a gun and to permanently attach the serial number. Prohibits selling, transferring a gun or aiding the manufacture of a gun without one. Prohibits the manufacture of a gun from plastics that does not have a serial number or is designed to not be detectable to security systems. Makes violations a Class C felony, or a Class B felony if the person knows the gun or gun parts to be stolen and that serial number has been altered or obliterated.

## HOUSE FILES (HF 489 – HF 498)

### **HF 489 HARMFUL INTERNET MATERIALS (Hayes)** (Public Safety)

Establishes civil liability for a business that knowingly and intentionally publishes or distributes material on the internet that is harmful to children and does not use reasonable methods to verify the age of the child. Allows awards of \$75,000 in damages, with costs, and attorney and witness fees. Excludes bona fide news reports and does not include news gathering organizations or ISP providers. Makes definitions.

### **HF 490 BUILDING DESIGN (P Thompson)** (State Government)

Prohibits local governments from adopting or enforcing building code rules or regulations that affect building design in certain aspects related to materials, rules more stringent than national model code rules and adopting rules on design elements unless certain conditions apply. States that the provisions do not affect rights of private parties in regard to design. See [SF 174](#)

### **HF 491 LIFE IMPACT STATEMENTS (Andrews)** (State Government)

Requires a life impact statement to be attached to every bill that prohibits or limits abortions. Requires committees to determine if a life impact statement is needed. Requires the LSA to review bills, resolutions and amendments to determine if a statement is needed. Allows a member to request a life impact statement.

### **HF 492 VEHICLE TITLES (Gustoff)** (Transportation)

Allows a person entitled to ownership of a vehicle of a decedent to file an affidavit on the right of ownership and to make any necessary odometer statement for obtaining a title as the affiant.

### **HF 493 VEHICLE SUBSCRIPTION COSTS (Andrews)** (Transportation)

Prohibits motor vehicle dealers from entering into contracts that include optional equipment or subscription fees unless the additional cost was included in the advertised price of the vehicle. Requires a contract with optional equipment or subscription fees to include a detailed description of the service and costs.

### **HF 494 COUNSELOR COMPACT (Health & Human Services; Successor to HF 90)**(Ways & Means)

Adopts the Professional Counselor Interstate Licensure Compact. Establishes a commission to administer the compact and includes various implementing provisions. Makes the compact effective after the adoption of the compact by ten states. See [SF 127](#)

### **HF 495 WHISTLEBLOWER COMPLAINTS (State Government; Successor to HSB 146) FM: Siegrist**

Gives the Ombudsman the discretion to decline to investigate a whistleblower complaint. Requires the decision to be in writing. Requires the Ombudsman to give any findings to a person or agency that is subject to the complaint.

### **HF 496 WARRANTLESS TOBACCO INSPECTIONS (State Government; Successor to HSB 184) FM: Collins**

Requires retailers of tobacco products and alternative nicotine products to allow warrantless searches and inspections by various law enforcement, fire and health officials and government agencies for violations of tobacco laws as a condition of receiving a permit.

### **HF 497 OPEN MEETINGS (State Government; Successor to HF 263) FM: Collins**

Exempts a function attended by three members of a body subject to open meetings laws that is hosted by a political party or a civic organization from the open meetings laws.

### **HF 498 DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME (State Government; Successor to HF 242) FM: Harris**

Establishes year-round Daylight Savings time.

## HOUSE FILES (HF 499 – HF 506)

### [HF 499 CHILD RESTRAINT SYSTEM LOSSES](#) (State Government; Successor to [HF 324](#)) *FM: Young*

Requires that the value of a child restraint system be included when determining a partial loss for an automobile (nine passengers or less vehicles). Applies to losses after 7/23.

### [HF 500 EDUCATION DIVERSITY WORK GROUP](#) (Gaines, 2 D's) (Education)

Requires the DOE to convene a working group with the BEE on the need for diversity and cultural competency training. Requires a report by December 2023.

### [HF 501 EVIDENCE & FILE PRESERVATION](#) (Jones) (Judiciary)

**Evidence:** Includes requirements for the preservation of biological evidence in aggravated misdemeanor and felony cases for 20 from the conviction or while the person is in custody. Requires the evidence to be stored until the SOL expires if there is no conviction. Requires enough biological evidence be stored to do a DNA profile. Requires an inventory of the evidence on the request of the defendant. Includes exceptions for not retaining or destroying such evidence. Allows certain persons to request a DNA profile. **Witnesses:** Requires a prosecutor to notify the defendant of an intent to introduce statements from an incarcerated witness, and to include the criminal history of the witness, any benefits the witness will receive and other information. Allows a court to limit the viewing of evidence by the defense counsel or to issue a protective order for the incarcerated witness. Requires prosecutors to maintain a registry of cases using incarcerated witnesses and for the DPS to maintain a central registry accessible to prosecutors and not otherwise open to open record requests. **Post-Conviction:** Requires prosecutors to retain the files of defendants convicted of felonies or aggravated misdemeanors through the term of imprisonment. Requires the prosecutor, to the extent allowed by law, to make the file available to the defendant for post-conviction relief. Allows the prosecutor to have the court examine the file if the prosecutor believes that releasing some of the information will cause harm and allows the court to determine that the prosecutor can withhold parts of the file. Requires the defense or appellate attorney to retain such files for seven years after the trial or until the sentence of the defendant is complete.

### [HF 502 INSULIN PRICE](#) (Turek) (Commerce)

Requires insurance coverage to cap the price of insulin at \$100 for a month supply.

### [HF 503 COYOTE BOUNTIES](#) (Jones) (Natural Resources)

Allows county supervisors to establish a \$10 bounty for coyotes.

### [HF 504 HCBS WAIVER CHECKS](#) (Jones) (State Government) **Wulf** (C), **Harris**, **Nielsen**

Includes additional persons who work for companies giving HCBS waiver services who do not give direct care to patients who must be approved by the HHS under a waiver due to the person having been convicted of a crime or having a founded abuse report. Includes requirements for the evaluation by HHS.

### [HF 505 METER REPLACEMENT](#) (Rinker) (Ways & Means)

Prohibits utilities from charging customers for the replacement of a meter.

### [HF 506 WORKFORCE HOUSING CREDITS](#) (Bossman) (Ways & Means)

Caps the allocation of tax credits for Workforce Housing at \$50 million, with \$25 million reserved for credits in small cities. Increases the maximum average cost for housing to \$316,320 (single-family in urban areas or small cities) and \$268,022 (multi-unit dwellings).

## HOUSE FILES (HF 507 – HF 510)

### **HF 507 IMMUNIZATION RESTRICTIONS** (Stoltenberg, 8 R's) (Health & Human Services)

Deems that the CDC, WHO or any federal or international agency, has no jurisdiction in Iowa. Prohibits using guidance from these agencies for mask, vaccine or medical testing mandates. Prohibits the HHS from requiring a person to enroll in any immunization registry or from using immunization tracking without written consent. Gives the AG enforcement powers.

### **HF 508 NOT RECOGNIZING MARRIAGES** (Sherman, 7 R's) (Health & Human Services)

Prohibits requiring an Iowa resident to recognize a same-sex marriage. Makes findings on the rights of the state to determine what marriage and objections to the federal law on respecting marriages.

### **HF 509 MARRIAGE DEFINITION** (Levin, 29 D's) (Judiciary)

Deems marriage as the union of two eligible parties and strikes conforming changes in regard to gender references in marriage provisions.

### **HF 510 ABORTION LAWSUITS** (Dunwell, 19 R's) (Judiciary)

Prohibits the use of abortion drugs and elective abortions. Establishes *qui tam* civil actions for private citizens to enforce the prohibitions. Allows the award of at least \$100,000 in damages, and attorney fees and costs, to a prevailing party. Includes liability for websites that make the drugs available and manufacturers but prohibits bringing suit against a woman who used or sought to use the drugs. Includes findings and intent language, definitions, provisions on venue and provisions on many other related matters.

## HOUSE STUDY BILLS (HSB 216 – HSB 219)

### **HSB 216 ENERGY BENCHMARKING** (Commerce) J Wills (C) Bagniewski, C Thomson

Prohibits local governments from using energy benchmarking (requiring a decrease in the average energy used by a property or requiring that the property use less energy than a similar property).

### **HSB 217 IGNITION INTERLOCKS** (Public Safety) Gustoff (C), Olson, Vondran

Adds additional periods where ignition interlock devices are required after a license suspension. Allows the period to be extended due to compliance violations. Includes additional grounds for compliance violations. Makes it a serious misdemeanor to remove an ignition interlock without authorization and new offenses for operating a vehicle without such a device installed for persons with temporary restricted licenses.

### **HSB 218 BANNING DIVERSITY AT STATE UNIVERSITIES** (Education) Collins (C), Ehlert, Stone

Prohibits diversity or inclusion offices at the state universities. Prohibits spending from any source on such matters. Prohibits state universities from spending any state money in FY 2024 until the universities certify compliance. Authorizes the AG to bring enforcement actions. Requires that any money that would be spent on diversity to be spent on merit scholarships for low-income students.

### **HSB 219 EDUCATION & LIBRARY PROGRAMS** (Education) Boden (C), Cahill, Hora

**Education:** Requires education programs from the state BOE be age-appropriate. Deems that any material with a visual or written description of a sex act to not be age-appropriate, but excludes human growth & development (sex ed) classes. **Libraries:** Requires schools to establish a K-12 library program to ensure only age-appropriate material in the library. Requires a qualified teacher librarian to direct the program in each attendance center. Includes regular reviews of the program.

## HOUSE STUDY BILLS (HSB 219 – HSB 223)

### [HSB 220](#) **DENTAL COMPACT** (State Government) **Collins** (C), **Baeth**, **Siegrist**

Establishes an interstate compact to allow licensed dentists and dental hygienists to practice in additional states. Establishes a commission to administer the compact. Makes the compact effective after the adoption by seven states.

### [HSB 221](#) **PODIATRIST RESIDENCY** (State Government) **Harris** (C), **Baeth**, **Young**

Requires podiatrists to have two years of an approved residency program when applying for a license and to show completion of the residency at the first license renewal. Applies to graduates after the effective date of the bill.

### [HSB 222](#) **GOVERNORS EDUCATION BILL** (Education) **Wheeler** (C), **Cahill**, **Johnson**

**Sex Ed:** Prohibits instruction on gender identify or sexual activity in grades K-3. Strikes required instruction on AIDS in Human Growth & Development (Sex Ed) courses and on HPV for grades 7-12. Requires sex ed to be age-appropriate and evidence-based in the kindergarten project. **Civics:** Requires the use of the US citizenship test in HS civics courses and that results be submitted to the DOE. Requires students to score 70% or to retake the test. **Emotional Learning:** Prohibits surveys on emotional learning or on physical health that are not required under law, unless the parent or guardian agree. Requires written notice of such surveys. **Books:** Requires schools to publish a list of the material used in class, lists of persons with student contact, books available in the library and procedures to request removal of materials. Requires the school to notify the DOE of the removal of a book and for the DOE to maintain a removal list. Requires the parents of a minor child in other districts give written consent before a child can check out a schoolbook on the removal list. **Gender ID:** Requires schools to report to parents if a child expresses a different gender identity, unless the school believes the report will lead to child abuse. Requires the school to then report to HHS instead for potential action as a ChINA case. **Other:** Allows parents to review all school records on a child. Prohibits school districts from any activity involving obscene material or sexually explicit material. Includes civil penalties for schools. Deems the parent as ultimately responsible for decisions affecting medical care, moral upbringing, religion, residence, and extracurriculars. See [SSB 1145](#)

### [HSB 223](#) **MINOR INTERNET GAMING** (Judiciary) **Kaufmann** (C), **Srinivas**, **Stone**

Requires social media and internet gaming sites to verify that children under 16 have parental permission to use the site. Requires a copy of the consent be sent to the parent. Makes definitions and establishes civil penalties for violations.

## SENATE FILES (SF 443 – SF 451)

### **SF 443 SUPERVISOR ELECTIONS** (State Government; Successor to [SF 314](#)) FM: *Driscoll*

Requires counties with a population of 60,000 or more to use Plan Three (districts) to elect supervisors. Eliminates the option for counties to use Plan Two to elect supervisors as of 2024. Requires supervisor vacancies to be filled through a special election.

### **SF 444 VETERAN PROGRAMS** (Veterans Affairs; Successor to [SF 236](#)) FM: *Reichman*

Defines veteran to meet federal definitions. Strikes certain CE requirements for county commissioners. Allows the DVA to receive donations and gifts to be used for training county commissioners and others. Strikes certain duties to train/certify and requires the DVA to verify that various officers are qualified. Includes other certification/CE requirements Prohibits using money from the Veterans Trust for cemetery development grants. Requires the county where a veteran lived to pay for the funeral expenses of a veteran, spouse or child, if the veteran died without means to pay such expenses. See [HF 259](#)

### **SF 445 BOARDS OF REVIEW** (Local Government; Successor to [SF 278](#)) FM: *Webster*

Allows a ten-member local board of review to appoint a 3-member sub-unit to conduct hearings and to make recommendations. Requires the full board to hear a protest heard by the sub-unit. Makes the sub-unit subject to open meeting laws. Effective on enactment. See [HF 420](#)

### **SF 446 COUNTY COMPENSATION** (Local Government; Successor to [SF 32](#)) FM: *Klimesh*

Requires county compensation boards to consider the economic health of the county, state and country when determining compensation schedules. Requires the board to document to the supervisors how the compensation levels were determined. Compensation schedule provisions similar to [HF 314](#)

### **SF 447 VOLUNTEER LENGTH OF SERVICE** (Local Government; Successor to [SF 272](#)) FM: *Shipley*

Authorizes various municipal entities that offer volunteer fire or EM services or with reserve peace officers to establish a length of service program for those providers. Requires the municipality and the head of the department to set eligibility requirements and to handle other matters. Establishes a fund under the DOR for matching grants. Appropriates \$1 million in Lottery funds. Requires the council to submit rules to the State Fire Marshal. Requires the DOR to adopt rules. See [HF 340](#)

### **SF 448 COUNTY COMPENSATION BOARDS III** (Local Government; Successor to [SF 170](#)) FM: *Klimesh*

Changes the membership of the county compensation board so that county supervisors hold two positions, appoint two positions and that the other county officers choose the other three members. Requires a county compensation board to meet at least twice before submitting recommendations, with one meeting a public hearing. Requires the review of specific comparable officers. Limits the ability of the board to reduce salaries. Requires the supervisors to adopt the recommendations after a review.

### **SF 449 INSTRUCTION PERMIT WORK DRIVING** (Transportation; Successor to [SSB 1154](#)) FM: *Dickey*

Allows a minor with an instruction permit to drive to and from work from 5 AM until 12:30 AM if the minor has a valid work permit and it is no more than 25 miles between work and home and works at a fixed location. Does not allow the driver to have passengers and requires the driver to file the work permit with the DOT. Makes violations subject to a \$200 fine.

### **SF 450 DELINQUENT JUDGMENTS** (Local Government; Successor to [SF 293](#)) FM: *Webster*

Allows a county attorney to collect delinquent judgment debt after 60 days. Allows cities and counties to develop set-off procedures.

### **SF 451 BOARD OF REVIEW MEETING** (Local Government; Successor to [SF 169](#)) FM: *Westrich*

Requires a board of review for property tax protests to determine a start date between May 1 and May 7.

## SENATE FILES (SF 452 – SF 458)

### [SF 452](#) ILEA TRAINING COSTS (Boulton) Shipley (C), Boulton, Rowley

Requires ILEA to become accredited through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies in order to allow ILEA to accredit regional training academies. Establishes a tuition fund to help local governments pay for their share of the cost of certifying an officer through ILEA.

### [SF 453](#) DOWNED POWER LINES (Koelker) (State Government)

Requires that an emergency vehicle be sent to, or warning lights be placed at the site of a downed electrical line as soon as practicable.

### [SF 454](#) CIVIL SERVICE POLICE & FF HIRES (Local Government; Successor to [SF 266](#)) FM: Webster

Allows a city to suspend civil service requirements to receive lists of qualified applicants after exams for hiring police and fire fighters for one year. Re-imposes the requirements at the end of the year unless the city acts to suspend requirements again.

### [SF 455](#) STORMWATER MANAGEMENT (Local Government; Successor to [SF 34](#)) FM: Webster

Prohibits local governments from adopting requirements for topsoil preservation at construction sites. Allows the regulation of stormwater runoff but does not allow more restrictive rates after construction than prior to construction. Limits the regulation of runoff from upstream properties.

### [SF 456](#) OUT-OF-COUNTY WARRANTS (Salmon) (Judiciary) Shipley (C), Quirnbach, Rowley

Deems the sheriff to be the chief law enforcement officer of the county and requires federal, out-of-state, state and out-of-county law enforcement officers to seek permission from the sheriff before executing a warrant in the county. Makes exceptions but allows for criminal charges for exceptions. Includes implementing provisions, including notice to the Governor, federal officials and others.

### [SF 457](#) CIVIL SERVICE DISCIPLINE (Local Government; Successor to [SF 231](#)) FM: Webster

**Board:** Strikes current membership provisions and allows between five and seven members on a civil service board in cities over 50,000. **Policies:** Strikes the current language regarding disciplining local government civil service employees. Enacts new language that a civil service employee cannot be unreasonably or unjustly subjected to disciplinary action but can be disciplined on a finding based on the preponderance of the evidence that the employee violated clearly established policies. Allows an appointing authority to peremptorily impose discipline based on reasonable grounds that the failure of an employee to act is in violation of law or clearly established policies, or is an immediate detriment to the public. **Appeals:** Gives cities the burden of proof to establish the charges and to show that the punishment is proportionate. Prohibits knowingly withholding evidence from an employee. Authorizes a Civil Service Commission to deliberate in closed session on the request of an employee. Requires the Commission to reverse the city decision, with prejudice, if the city fails to meet the burden of proof and to determine if a disciplinary action is reasonable. Allows the Commission to act on a majority vote, except for removals requiring a unanimous vote. **Courts:** Makes court review *de novo* and allows for the award of fees and costs.

### [SF 458](#) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING RIGHTS (T Taylor, 15 D's) (Workforce)

Generally strikes the changes to collective bargaining made in 2017 and restores collective bargaining rights as of then.

## SENATE FILES (SF 459 – SF 463)

### **SF 459 EARNED INCOME TAX CREDIT** ([Jochum](#), [All D's](#)) (Ways & Means)

Increases the Iowa EITC to 30% of the federal credit.

### **SF 460 CHILD CREDITS** ([Jochum](#), [All D's](#)) (Ways & Means)

Reduces the number of thresholds for the Iowa Child & Dependent Care Credit to 5 and increases the amount of the credit to 100% of the federal credit for the lowest incomes and 50% at the highest levels. Indexes the income cap for the Early Childhood Development Credit.

### **SF 461 VETERAN BUSINESS LOANS** ([Veterans Affairs](#); Successor to [SSB 1174](#)) *FM: Reichmann*

Allows the State Treasurer to make loans through the Small Business Linked Investment Program to businesses which are 51% owned by veterans. Defines veterans.

### **SF 462 MEDICAID RECOVERIES & MCO PREMIUMS** ([HHS](#); Successor to [SSB 1167](#)) *FM: Costello*

Makes changes to Medicaid governance, including on recoveries from 3rd-parties and the taxation of premiums related to MCOs. Includes implementing provisions. See [HSB 177](#)

### **SF 463 SHOOTINGS & ARRESTS** ([Driscoll](#)) (Judiciary)

Requires a county attorney to do a written review and make a charging decision, or refer to a grand jury, or refer to the AG, for cases involving a serious injury or death in an officer-involved shooting. Requires the officer and the law enforcement agency be promptly given a copy of the review. **Arrests:** Allows a peace officer to make an arrest anywhere in the state under specified circumstances (offense committed in the officer's presence, if the officer has reasonable grounds to believe someone has committed an offense, reasonable grounds to believe domestic abuse has occurred or in the case of certain official communications to the officer). Prohibits an officer from setting up a routine patrol outside of the jurisdiction.

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## SENATE STUDY BILLS (SSB 1199 – SSB 1203)

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**SSB 1199 UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS** (Commerce) **Brown** (C), **Giddens**, **Webster**

Includes persons acting under contract with an excavator as excavators for notices regarding underground facility excavations. Makes changes to notice timelines.

**SSB 1200 AUDITOR INFORMATION** (State Government) **Bousselot** (C), **Koelker**, **Weiner**

Prohibits the State Auditor from having access to the medical, academic or other private information of an individual during an audit.

**SSB 1201 TRANSMISSION LINE RESTORATION** (Natural Resources) **Sweeney** (C), **Knox**, **Shipley**

Requires persons building electrical transmission lines to submit a plan to the IUB on restoring affected farmland and to designate a point-of-contact after securing the franchise. Requires the IUB to adopt rules and review plans. Allows landowners to file a complaint with the IUB for a failure to comply. Allows the IUB to resolve complaints and to assess civil penalties. See [SF 428](#)

**SSB 1202 PEACE OFFICER ARRESTS** (Judiciary) **Dawson** (C), **Knox**, **Zaun**

Allows a peace officer to make an arrest anywhere in the state under specified circumstances (offense committed in the officer's presence, if the officer has reasonable grounds to believe someone has committed an offense, reasonable grounds to believe domestic abuse has occurred or in the case of certain official communications to the officer). Prohibits an officer from setting up a routine patrol outside of the jurisdiction.

**SSB 1203 OVERWEIGHT VEHICLES** (Transportation) **Klimesh** (C), Committee of the Whole

Proposes a resolution to urge Congress to allow heavier vehicles to use the interstate. See [HSB 212](#)
